As we ended last year's meeting season, we were happy to welcome Kenny Workman, Director of P3, to our meeting as the program topic.


While promoting the current season of shows, Kenny gave us a wonderful look into the history of the program and all the things it offers to the community besides great theatre.

46 years young, P3 was started by a couple who believed the Sussex County should have a theatre company. Their first production was "Carnival" and it was a "touring" company as there was no dedicated space at the time. It continued this was for 20 years until land was purchased from the town of

Georgetown. From there it has evolved into a state of the art community showplace with scores of volunteers both on and off the stage. There are only two full-time paid employees.

P3 offers many different opportunities for interested community members. There are 5 main stage shows each season. There is a "Radio Theatre" group as well as a Shakespeare group that performs 1 full-scale production a year. On the Edge focus on "edgier" productions while Dreamers United has a focus on cultural productions in the Black History genre.

For the budding enthusiast, there is PPPJrs which is comprised of middle and high school students. They take workshops to learn new skills and perform 1 full scale production in the summer. This goes hand in hand with the 2 summer camps that P3 offers to approximately 80 students.

Welcome to the start of a new year of Western Sussex AAUW. I am so pleased to say that Barbara Johnson has agreed to be our meeting Reservation Coordinator. So to RSVP for meetings, please contact Barbara. Her contact information is in this newsletter.

I am also grateful that Ellen Wright will remain as our Finance Officer, Pat Reilly-Butcher as our Membership Chair, Pat Davidson as our Secretary, and Mikki Madden as our Newsletter Editor. We would still like to have two more members step forward to fill the roles of Program Planner and Public Policy Chairperson. Currently, the board is trying to plan the branch programs and meetings. I am starting my fourth term as president of the branch. I am sorry that I don't have the time I would like to dedicate to this position between my work and family responsibilities but I do my best to keep our branch together. I hope that one of you will volunteer to be President-Elect and bring some fresh ideas to our branch.

We are excited about our first general meeting which will take place on Wednesday September 25 at 6 PM at the Seaford Museum. Our idea was to have a downtown Seaford night. Food will be catered by Hard to Handle sub shop with some additions by your board members and a generous donation of wine by Barbara Johnson. The cost for the program and dinner will be \$12 each. This includes a \$3 donation per person to the Museum, food and beverages. The sandwiches are big and delicious so come hungry! We will be given a private tour of the museum and have a short business meeting. Please RSVP by this Friday, September 20th to Barbara.

We have discussed our branch finances before at general meetings. Our operating funds come from our branch dues of \$5 each. Multiplied by 29 members, this comes to \$145. Our branch liability insurance, which we are required to have, costs \$180 a year. Of course we have other operating expenses that we need to cover as well, for example guest speaker dinners and our annual donation to AAUW Funds. So you see our dilemma. The board considered raising the branch dues but decided against it this year because of the increase in the association dues. We do not use any of the geranium sale proceeds for operations but we do have to utilize some of the Fall Fundraiser proceeds to balance our operating budget.

This year we propose to increase the cost of our dinner meetings held at the Manor House by \$1 from \$14 to \$15 each. We pay the Manor House \$13 a person for the food so the remaining \$2 per person can go into the branch operating fund. So if you attend all 5 general meetings, this will only cost you an additional \$5 over the course of the year. We know that the residents of the Manor House do not pay the \$13 for dinner because this is included in their residence fees. However, we would like to ask that the ladies from the Manor House also begin to pay \$2 per meeting into the branch operating fund. We will answer questions about this and take suggestions from the members during our upcoming meeting.

Lastly, the online AAUW dues payment system, known as the MPP is now up and running. We will use this system next year. We will be offering more information on how this works and also try to set up a time perhaps at the Manor House, when board members will be available to help members use this system to pay their dues. After we do this once this May, I'm sure it will become old hat as they say. The option to pay by check will also remain for those choose this format. We appreciate the majority of you who paid your dues by the June 20 deadline. This makes it so much simpler for our membership and finance officers. I don't mean to sound harsh, but next year, for those of you who do not pay your dues by the branch deadline, you will be asked to pay online using the MPP out of consideration for our branch and state treasurers who end up having to process your dues individually. We will have more information on this throughout the year and will help everyone who needs assistance.
